Look

- 2. Do you find yourself asking questions to learn more about it? Or do you tend to try to change the subject so you don't have to hear any more about it?

Book Luke 9:28-36

A few days after Jesus acknowledges that he is the Christ, Jesus and his friends go up the mountain to pray. While they are there, Moses and Elijah appear with Jesus and Jesus' appearance changes. And, just like at Jesus' baptism, a voice from a cloud says about Jesus, "This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!"

- 1. Do you find this story believable? Why or why not?
- 2. When you read this passage, what questions do you have?

Canon Linda said that when the holy gets close to us we get scared and so we start asking questions. But, our questions drive us out of the story and back into our own concerns and worries. She said that Native American storytellers begin stories by saying, "I don't know if this is the way it happened, but I know the story is true."

- 1. What truth do you see in the story of the transfiguration, even if the events might not have unfolded exactly as the story is told?
- 2. What questions are you asking about your faith life now that might be keeping you from being closer to God?
- 3. How can you look past those questions, and allow yourself to stand in the presence of the holy one?
