Read SLOWLY: Psalm 23

This Psalm, ascribed to David, is perhaps the most ubiquitously known Psalm among Christians. Undoubtedly you've heard it at least once, but many have never discussed it in a group. Like prayers and creeds, it has become almost more of an act of speaking than a focus for introspection.

- 1. What provides comfort to you personally in this Psalm, and why does it speak you?
- 2. What part seems to challenge you, and why does it strike you so?
- 3. What makes your experience of this Psalm unique from the others around you?

Took

One mystery of the Gospel is how it speaks to each person wherever they are at. Psalm 23 is a prime example of this. It's a blessed reminder of how we are each called to reach our neighbor in fellowship and meet them wherever they might be in their faith journey.

- 1. Why is important to approach each person where they are at rather than try to direct them down your own path?
- 2. In what ways can our differences make us a stronger community?
- 3. Who is someone you know well that you can practice doing a better job of meeting them where they are at this week?
